## **COLLABORATIVE INITIATIVE**



As law enforcement professionals across the nation grapple with increased concerns about social justice and police reform, while simultaneously navigating the unchartered coronavirus era, community support for law enforcement is needed now more than ever. Realizing that support requires deepening the ways that police and residents relate to one another. For that reason, the Major County Sheriffs of America is proud to join every major national law enforcement professional and membership organization, the One Congregation One Precinct initiative (OneCOP), and the three entities in the federal government that deal most directly with local policing to jointly organize a historic law enforcement-community outreach initiative. This effort is entitled National Faith and Blue Weekend (NFBW).

Scheduled for October 9-11, 2020 to coincide with National Community Policing Week, NFBW will facilitate a movement where law enforcement professionals and residents build connections that break-down divides, decrease biases, increase familiarity and spur ongoing collaboration. In particular, houses of worship will be the foundation of building these relationships as they represent the canvas of the diverse backgrounds of each town, city, and neighborhood - collectively touching the lives of hundreds of millions. The activities that will be a part of NFBW will include virtual and in-person options for forums, community walks, picnics, athletic competitions, crime/safety briefings and other positive events geared toward fostering an environment of healing and reconciliation.
